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Vendors that get state contracts, this hearing is for you **Grand Junction Sentinel**

Any Western Slope company that does business with the state might want to listen in today to a live-stream discussion with the Colorado Department of Personnel and Administration. That's because that state agency is holding what it expects to be a well-attended public hearing on attempts to "modernize" the state's procurement code, department officials said. Called for under a bill that was partly sponsored by two Republican Western Slope lawmakers - Sen. Ray Scott of Grand Junction and Rep. Bob Rankin of Carbondale - the department has scheduled a single hearing in Denver to hear comments about the code,

which all state agencies are required to use when awarding contracts to private vendors.

The maps on the wall at Democrat Rachel Zenzinger's state Senate District 19 campaign headquarters in Arvada are a web of lines outlining voter precincts, each precinct speckled with marker colors. Some precincts are predominantly Republican, some predominantly Democratic, and there are numbers written onto each of them.

"479-480" reads one of them, another "412-410." In 2014, Zenzinger lost that first precinct to incumbent Republican Sen. Laura Woods by one vote. She won the second one by two votes. It's an eye-popping map in part because so many of the voter totals are separated by ultraslim margins.

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Colorado breaks tourism record with 77.7 million visitors spending \$19.1 billion

For the fifth year in a row, Colorado hosted a record number of tourists who have left a record amount of cash in their wake.

The Colorado Tourism Office on Wednesday reported that 77.7 million visitors to the state in 2015 spent an all-time high of \$19.1 billion, generating \$1.13 billion in state and local taxes, an increase of almost 7 percent from 2014.

Colorado's 31 percent rebound in visitation from the tourism-pinching depth of the recession back in 2009 is nearly double the national recovery of 16 percent.

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Treasurer decries cost of ColoradoCare

A proposed constitutional amendment that would provide universal health care in Colorado also would bankrupt the state.

That was the message Colorado Treasurer Walker Stapleton brought to Sterling Tuesday morning. About two dozen people gathered at Old Town Bistro Tuesday to hear Stapleton's message. The meeting turned into a sometimes spirited discussion of all that's wrong with the health care system in the United States.

The proposal, titled Amendment 69 on the November election ballot, would levy a 10 percent income tax on all Coloradans, in addition to the regular state income tax. One-third of the tax would be paid by workers and the rest would be paid by employers. In exchange, however, employers would not be required to offer health insurance benefits and workers would be exempt from the Affordable Care Act's mandate to carry some kind of health care insurance. Taxable income would include rents, interest, dividends, capital gains, business proprietors' income, Social Security, pension benefits and annuities.

Colorado's real gross domestic product -- the value of the goods and services produced by the state's economy -- increased by 3 percent in the first quarter of 2016 from the previous quarter.

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Colorado enters Union as 38th state, Aug. 1, 1876

After President Andrew Johnson vetoed Colorado's first bid for statehood, it entered the Union on August 1st in 1876 when President Ulysses S. Grant issued a proclamation making Colorado the 38th state. Its nickname derives from the timing of its accession: It is known as the Centennial State in honor of the 100th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. Originally, Colorado was part of the Nebraska, Utah, Kansas and New Mexico Territories. In 1859, residents formed a provisional territorial government, calling themselves the Territory of Jefferson. Two years later, as the Civil War approached, Congress created the Territory of Colorado.

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Right-to-die campaign turns in 160,000 signatures to put

measure on ballot

A campaign to put a "medical aid in dying" measure on the November ballot in Colorado has turned in 160,000 voter signatures to the Secretary of State's Office, well over the 98,000 required to get the measure on the ballot.

The "End of Life Options" measure would allow terminally ill Coloradans with six months or less to live to obtain a prescription to end their life. The drugs must be self-administered and be approved by two doctors who found the patient "mentally capable."

The Colorado Democratic Party platform includes a provision in support of Amendment 69, the ColoradoCare initiative that would create a universal health care system for state residents. But the House Majority Project, an effort by state Democrats to help the party maintain or increase its hold on the Colorado House, recently sent a memo to the 59 Democratic candidates with talking points in opposition to the measure.

The July 18 memo caused some party elected officials to express concerns about the opposing approaches from the party and candidate's stances on the contentious ballot measure. The memo was reportedly followed up with a conference call two days later to Democratic candidates, where project staff explained each candidate could decide to use or ignore the talking points.
